DOWN:

- Eaten to attract wealth; they're shaped like an ancient form of currency.
- Repeating cycle represented by twelve animal signs.
- People honored during the Chinese New Year.
- The final day of the Chinese New Year celebrations.
- Chinese character displayed upside down on red diamond shaped paper (or fabric).
- Intricately designed decorations that are taped to windows.
- Small explosives wrapped in paper, strung together to create a loud noise.
- The number of days Chinese New Year is celebrated.
- Festive spheres hung during the Chinese New Year.
- Do this to your home before Chinese New Year to sweep away bad luck.
- A lucky color seen during the Chinese New Year.

ACROSS:

- A performance where a team of dancers manipulate a large dragon puppet with poles.
- Two vertical strips paper (or fabric) with poetry hung on both sides of a doorway.
- The gift that is put inside red envelopes.
- The type of calendar used to determine the date of the Chinese New Year.
- A performance where two dancers operate the head and tail of a lion costume.
- Eaten to attract abundance; homophone for the word "surplus".
- Another name for the Chinese New Year.
- The number of animals in the Chinese Zodiac.
- A legendary monster frightened by the color red & loud noises.
- Gift pouches filled with money.
- Food eaten for a long life; very long, uncut noodles.
